

Continuing from last month's article: When Mary, Kathy's mom, came to live with us about ten years ago her health was failing. Once she moved in with us her diet changed, and she started eating healthier. For a time, her health had substantially improved after she started living with us. Mary would come to church with us periodically, and she enjoyed Mass. She always prayed with us before meals and occasionally she would say the rosary with us.

In December of last year, Mary was hospitalized for an infection and on her release was placed in a nursing home. She, like everybody else who entered a nursing facility during the Covid pandemic, was placed in a quarantine status. That meant she had to be placed in a room for two weeks. and she was not able to leave except in an emergency. Her meals were brought to her, and she was not able to enjoy the socialization normally associated with a nursing facility. After she was out of quarantine, she still spent most of her time in isolation from other people. When we would visit her at first it was through her window. We would give her a call on her cell phone, and then we would have the staff

A little over a month ago, we were finally able to visit Mary, face to face in her room, but we were required to wear a shield and a mask while maintaining social distancing. got a call informing us that she was dying. When we visited her after the phone call, she had already became incoherent. We then tried to stay with her all the time. As things progressed Mary was given morphine because she was acting as though she was in pain. The nursing home staff just wanted to keep her comfortable during the process.

Mary did have a very peaceful death. We had been praying the rosary and several Divine Mercy Chaplets over her. When her time came the family surrounded her and prayed together. Once she passed, I prayed out loud the "Rite after Death", which was comforting for all of us. We then let the staff know that she had passed.

Mary had preplanned her funeral 25 years ago, which was a tremendous blessing for the family. She had everything pretty well spelled out the way she wanted it. So the viewing, the funeral, and the burial were all done in Evansville, her home town, according to her wishes. She had a very nice service, and it was everything I am sure she had hoped for. We certainly miss her and our prayers continue. In fact, we pray the Novena of the Sacred Heart of Jesus for her daily. Praying helps our grief and provides us great comfort and peace. I want to thank all of you who reached out to her, and please keep her in your prayers.

In May of every year, Australians submit themselves to a national experience of repentance. Sounds unusual, but it's true. First, there's National Sorry Day (this year it's May 26), which is followed by National Reconciliation Week, which this year is May 26-June 3.

According to one source, National Sorry Day, also known as National Day of Healing, is "an annual event that has been held in Australia on May 26 since 1998, to remember and commemorate the mistreatment of the country's indigenous peoples, as part of an ongoing process of reconciliation between the indigenous peoples and the settler population." The week of reconciliation which follows is intended "to celebrate the history and culture of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australia, and foster reconciliation, discussion and activities."

This is a great idea, and I wish the United States had such a week-long period of national repentance. We have so much of which to repent: slavery, the treatment of Native Americans and ongoing racism for starters. I know there are some who may disagree about the need to do this at a national level, but I believe it would be a good thing.

But, having a pastoral heart as I do, I also think it would be good for every church in America to have a Sorry Sunday, and a Week of Reconciliation. Sorry Sunday would be a day in which we fervently repent for our sins on a personal level. We draw up plans to make amends. We approach those whom we have wronged. We make right the wrongs we have committed. Perhaps Lent would be a good time to designate one Sunday as Sorry Sunday.

This could be followed by a church-wide Week of Reconciliation. Devotional messages, reconciling activities, worship and prayer, vesper services, and more. Such a week could be a time of renewal and a refreshing of the Holy Spirit in the church.

But what about us? Perhaps we should think about having a Sorry Day once a month or once a week. But only if we find it hard to say, "I'm sorry," and offer an apology. We don't need a special Sorry Day, do we, if we already make it a habit to correct an injustice when it is done, or to apologize when a harsh word is uttered, or to offer the hand of friendship to the friendless?

Let's not forget how to say "I'm sorry," and let's not forget how to swallow our pride and make things right when things go wrong.

Today is Father's Day and across the country men are enjoying greeting cards that say something along the lines of: "Thanks Dad, for being the best dad ever." My father passed away a number of years ago. Was he a perfect father? No. But he did many good things, and gave me a lot to think about.

When I was 18, dad gave me a pair of hiking boots. They had a cushioned tongue and collar, eyelets securely sewn into the leather, and a Carrarmato lug pattern in Vibram outsoles.

I still have those boots. They've been all over the world. They have carried me over thousands of miles of trails, roads and city streets. These boots have stories to tell. That's why I can't get rid of them. When I see those aging boots, I see a metaphor for life. After all, they carried me and protected my feet.

- 1. They were no good unless I put them on.
- 2. I had to lace them up nice and snug or they just would have flopped around and given me blisters.
- 3. They were particularly good when traveling on scree and talus.
- 4. They had awesome gripping power on rock.
- 5. They took the fear out of going into the difficult places, like muddy, rocky or slippery surfaces.
- 6. Occasionally, they needed to be resoled.

You can understand why I see these boots as a metaphor for life, particularly faith. Isn't it interesting that faith is described in the Bible as a gift (see Ephesians 2:8)? This is a gift that God the Father gives us. As such, it is no good unless we allow our faith to get some exercise and carry us through life.

My faith has taken me many places in my spiritual life. It has protected me from many dangers and mistakes. It had amazing gripping power to help me negotiate the dark valleys and narrow places. With my faith, the fear is gone.

Yes, sometimes my faith needs to be re-souled. I need periodic renewal. Just as the soles of my boots needed cleaning and brushing, likewise my faith-soul needs to be kept clean, and all the dirt and pebbles dug out and discarded.

This is the lesson I remember on Father's Day.

In Willa Cather's novel, *Death Comes for the Archbishop*, she tells the story of the Ácoma Indians, some of whom lived on a certain high mesa.

One day, Bishop LaTour set out with a guide from Santa Fe to visit some missions to the west. They traveled by mule through plains with long vistas, and spectacular spires of red rocks, passing through juniper and pinon, until they came upon two mesas.

Atop one of these flattop rocks used to be an Ácoma village, Jacinto the guide told the bishop. The only access to the top was a staircase, easily defended.

The bishop asked Jacinto why the Ácoma had thought to flee the earth and climb this rock and settle a village there. Jacinto explained that the Ácoma had enemies. There were periodic manhunts, and the Ácoma, tired of running, fled not to the north, south, east or west, but up. *There on this rock they found safety.*

They grew crops on the plain *around* the rock, and *came off the rock to hunt*, but there was always a place to turn. They were always able to ascend the rock in which they found security.

Today, the Ácoma Pueblo is a National Historic Landmark. It's about 60 miles west of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and it still sits atop a mesa that rises more than 350 feet above the plain. On this solid rock, the Ácoma have lived for hundreds of years.

A rock, a mesa, a cleft in a cliff, a mountain and the hills — all of these are mentioned in the Bible as places of refuge.

The ancient Israelites lived in country that was in many places similar to the territory in the southwest United States. Sometimes, they had enemies which consisted of roving bands of tribal warriors, or armies from small neighboring nations. Having a place to hide was important.

No wonder the psalmist writes, "You who live in the shelter of the Most High, who abide in the shadow of the Almighty, will say to the LORD, 'My refuge and my fortress; my God, in whom I trust" (91:1-2).

When we are distressed, we can cry to God. God is our mesa, our rock and refuge.
